Our own Patsy Mylchreest has been tasked with sourcing the food for breakfasts and lunches at the annual meeting. As you know, Patsy is always super-organized and when she calls you to help, please do so
- **4. Entering the Federated Show in February.** This show is huge and always interesting. This year the schedule includes

a club tabletop challenge. Ona and Rhea will be heading up this effort and the first organizational meeting will be held at my house on 9/16/22. All are welcome.

Our October meeting will be held at "The Farmer's Daughter" in South Kingstown, Rhode Island. There we will tour the farm and look at the displays and the fabulous nursery. We will hopefully then adjourn to the Matunuck Oyster Bar for lunch. We will need 8-10 drivers to make this program work. The Treasurer's report involved the proceeds from the Flower Show. The tickets brought in \$16,200, and the auction \$5,500.

Show expenses were \$7,400. Treasurer Mary Xenelis explained that the operational expenses were separated out; social occasions are separated from Program. New is the Civic Projects line, such as Pollinator Pathway. For the next year, monthly reports will be different. She will send explanations out in June so we will know how to read the information, especially the investment reports. Statements will be sent quarterly. This new budget was moved by Mary and seconded by Rob. Passed.

Two letters were read complimenting the Flower Show. Flower Show Chairman Maria thanked everyone for their help, especially Rob, Judy and Laney for the Hort part, Anne for the work she did with the Judges, Ona and Sally for their work with Floral Design. Zone II Flower Show Rep Valerie Meade evaluated the club: we received a Judge's Commendation in regards to the Show, and another one for exceptional hospitality for the Luncheon. Lynn's panels were considered excellent. The Marian Fuller Brown Conservation award was given MGC. Jane mentioned the lovely Preview Party and thanked Patsy for arranging it.

Hetti spoke of the Visiting Garden trip for 6/16 to the Bridge of Flowers in MA. It will be about a 1 and 1/2 hour trip, and some non-Garden Club folks will attend.

Judy and Laney thanked everyone who exhibited in Hort. Laney thanked Jane for

encouraging Jim Landry to exhibit. He owns Evergreen Landscaping. Judy brought plant divisions to share, and told us that Pat Fernandes of the Newport Garden Club lent some of their glassware for the Hort part of the Show. So very helpful.

The meeting adjourned at 11:50 a.m. Kathie moved to adjourn; Rob seconded.

HORTICULTURE:

Goldfinches are having a feast in my garden, stripping dead flower heads for seeds.

Before they consume all those seeds, now is the time to go out in your gardens and harvest seeds from your favorite annuals and/or perennials. We are going to have a winter sowing workshop in January! Leave some for the birds, of course, but do not delay or there will be nothing left!

Some good candidates for January sowing include coneflowers, beebalm, rudbeckia, heliopsis, poppies, cardinal flower, lobelia, and asters. You can also get ready with set-

ups for later plantings of cold weather vegetables and herbs, and annuals.

Winter sowing is like creating your own mini-cold frames out of milk jugs, clamshell packages (salad, rotisserie chicken, etc.) or even 2-liter soda bottles. Save a few of them as we move into fall. More details to follow!
