Minutes of the Middletown Garden Club Business Meeting, October 19, 2023

President Holzberg, called the meeting to order at 1:10 pm in the Hubbard Room of Russell Library. She thanked hostesses Marcia and Christina for providing a beautiful array of seasonal fare. She also thanked the members who attended the Common Council meeting in October to object to the replacement of Spear Park with a high-rise apartment building.

Committee Reports:

Admissions: Maria asked members to check with friends who may want to join the club, as we have openings. **Civic Improvement:** Edwina explained some of the new options for grants in this area, and suggested possible activities the club might pursue, including the re-activation of the greenhouse at the former Woodrow Wilson Middle School, as well as installing a pollinator garden at Smith Park. Discussion followed.

Communications: Debby requested that Jane send her a packet of information, since no one was able to attend the club chairmen's meeting in November.

Conservation: Sally reminded club members to think about attending NAL in person, as it is a hugely educational experience.

Flower Show: Maria asked if any members want to participate in the CT Flower Show in Hartford in February of 2024. There is a horticulture class that involves a 36" round table top.

Holiday Bazaar: Lynn said that she will be looking for a limited number of workers for the event, which will be on Sunday, December 3rd at the Wadsworth Mansion. We will have an inside booth, and space is limited.

Horticulture: Kathy has tallied the responses to her query about Hort programs. The most frequent request was for a workshop or program on soil health.

Hospitality: Maria reported that the club's holiday party will be held at the Wadsworth Mansion this year on Thursday, December 14. The charge per person will be \$50.

Rooftop: Stephan said that there will be just two more sessions for cleaning up the garden for the season.

Treasurer: On a motion by Mary, seconded by Jane, the club voted unanimously to apply a gift of \$100 in memory of Dan Ryan toward planting more 'Julia Child' roses in the Russell Library garden.

Visiting Gardens: Stephan thanked those who participated in the Cromwell garden tours, and helped with the planning.

Wreath Workshop: Ona passed around a sign-up sheet for wreaths and Lynn passed one for almond cakes. The workshop will be at CT Forest and Parks on Monday, November 27th from 9 am till the work is done. She reminded members to bring natural decorations, such as pinecones.

New/Old Business:

Jane and Maria discussed a letter of support from the club to DEEP for the City's urban forestry grant application.

The vote to approve the letter was unanimous.

Rhea Higgins then presented an overview of flowers in European art, with fascinating explanations of their historical and Biblical references. Maria adjourned the meeting at 3:15 pm.
