#### CHC ROOFTOP GARDEN

Much discussion of soil and water conditions led to Nat Holmes (CHC) promising to get the watering schedule for the group.

Lynne Garner proposed using moisture/water gauges for the beds to determine saturations. It was agreed that would be helpful.

Lisa Christensen of MARC has funds available for use through a grant. She suggests we think about ways to use the funds for rooftop garden improvement. Lisa has a new assistant who should be around to help up on the rooftop. Her crew will begin helping on May 8 on the rooftop.

Sources of seeds and plants will include the Heritage Market in Wethersfield, and Johnny's Select Seeds. Chantal Foster will pick up tomatoes from Gotta's Farm. It was decided that hybrids were best (good producers), with a few cherry tomato plants added, for a total of 8 plants.

Chantal has onions for planting and she will coordinate with Nat Holmes of CHC for access to plant them.

Onions, leeks, and potatoes will be in a new bed this year, swapping them with last year's tomato bed.

It was determined that we need to replenish the soil each year in the beds.

May 1 at 10 a.m. will be the 1st day for the rooftop work.

During harvest season there will be two pickings/week so veggies don't overripen. We are open to new recruits for the weekly work.
