HORTICULTURE:

Details for the Gavel Challenge (to be entered at the Zone II Meeting in Greenwich on September 14):

- 1) The pot size is whatever is appropriate to the size of the plant. Remember your 2/3 & 1/3 rule. We have given 10" diameter as a maximum size, but smaller sizes (ex. 8") might be fine. Containers are measured at the diameter of the widest point on the inside of the rim at the soil line.
- 2) Plants must be exhibited in terra cotta containers that are clean, unobtrusive and compatible with the exhibit. Terra cotta saucers required. Disguised double potting and top dressing are permitted. Top dressing must not float when watered.
- 3) If an individual club grower is a novice, that should be indicated on the Entry card.

Definition:

A novice is an individual exhibitor who has not won a first-place ribbon or a

GCA Special Award in Horticulture at a GCA Flower Show, GCA Major Flower Show, or a Sanctioned Non- GCA Major Flower Show.

4) We request organic methods of growing:

GCA Definition of Organic Gardening Organic: the system of growing plants without the use of herbicides, chemical pesticides or fertilizers in order to create a healthy, self-sustaining environment in natural balance, rich in biodiversity. Please let me know if you have a worthy entry for this event!

Minutes of the Middletown Garden Club Business Meeting, May 18, 2023

President Holzberg called the meeting to order at 11:10 am at the home of Anne McCloskey. A motion to approve the minutes of March 16, 2023, was made, with a correction to show that Deb Patrician is no longer an active member of the club. The corrected minutes were approved unanimously. Membership Chair Amy Albert read a letter of nomination for Stephan Allison, and Maria read her seconding letter.

The nomination was voted upon and approved unanimously.

President Holzberg requested committee reports to be either brief or submitted in writing.

Archives: Kathie reported she is looking for a summer intern to help organize and scan archival material.

Communications: Debbie reported that the Middletown Press had an article about the club's trip to the High Line with Mayor Florsheim and Directors Holden and Kozikowski.

Flower Arranging: Ona announced that the 2024 WAFA flower show will be held in Oman, and all are welcome to attend. Maria is planning to

enter the Litchfield GC flower show in June.

Horticulture: Kathy asked for volunteers to grow sunflowers for the Gavel Challenge at the Zone II meeting in September.

Awards: Co-chair Judy announced the club's award for exemplary commitment to youth education to the Steward Outdoor Day School at Bushy Hill Nature Center, which was accepted by Jen Malaguti. Judy reported that our club donated pollinator plants to the Day School, and the students will be planting them shortly. Jen Malaguti said that the students are "learning on the land" and will be tracking the dragonflies' first appearance at the camp; she thanked Judy and the club for the support of her program.

Rockfall Symposium: Jane reported that the Tree Symposium was a great success, with over 110 attendees, and thanked Lynne and Kim for helping with the luncheon.

At 11:35, on a motion by Elaine, seconded by Kathie, the May business meeting was adjourned.

At 11:40, Maria called the Annual Meeting to order and asked for a motion to approve the minutes from the previous annual meeting in May of 2022. With a correction to show that Kathy Meyering was in attendance, the minutes were approved unanimously.

Maria then delivered her report on the events of the past year, and listed her goals for the first year of her presidency.

All her goals were met or exceeded, including:

- 1. Progress on the pedestrian bridge over Route 9
- 2. A successful year of Pollinator Pathway advocacy
- Preparations for the 2024 GCA Annual Meeting in Hartford
- 4. The club's entry of a tablescape for the CT Flower Show in February, 2023 at the CT Convention Center. The entry received THREE blue ribbons.

Other highlights of the year included visits to the Farmer's Daughter in Rhode Island, to the CT Flower Collective in Meriden, the High Libe and Little Island gardens in NYC. In May, club members filled the thirteen outdoor flower pots at the Middletown Housing Authority center.
