# MIDDLETOWN GARDEN CLUB MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF FEBRUARY 16, 2023:

In the absence of President Holzberg, Vice-President Kim Wuestefeld called the meeting to order at 1:05 pm at the CT Forest and Park headquarters. She introduced and welcomed our newest member, Lynne Garner, an active volunteer with the Pollinator Pathway group.

On a motion by Amy, seconded by Kathie, the minutes of the November 2022 meeting were approved. On a motion by Lynn, seconded by Amy, the January minutes were approved. On a motion by Amy, seconded by Kathie, all outstanding Treasurer's reports were accepted.

Vice-President Wuestefeld reported on recent activities, including the club's

entry in the CT Flower Show in Hartford. She reminded members of the April 26 trip to the High Line and asked for payments to be made promptly to Mary.

Admissions Chair Amy Albert read nominating and seconding letters by Jane Harris and Kathy Meyering, on behalf of Letitia (Tisha) Ferguson, who has volunteered with our club through the Pollinator Pathway program and the October planting at Harbor Park. The nomination was approved unanimously.

Kathie said that the Archives work is progressing, and it would be helpful to have someone work with her on scanning the old documents.

Jane reported that Sally D'Aquila has suggested a tree should be planted in honor of Juanie Flagg's 100<sup>th</sup> birthday and asked for suggestions. Laney recommended planting a native tree in the area around the vernal pool at Long Hill Estate, a site which Juanie worked on tirelessly during the late 1990s.

Edwina reminded members to vote for their Founders Fund choice in advance, if not able to attend the March meeting, when ballots will be available.

Jane announced that Earth Day will be celebrated in Middletown on April 22 at Harbor Park, and there will be environmental speakers, including Tom Christopher, who is being sponsored by Pollinator Pathway.

Arbor Day is April 28, and several trees will be dedicated. The club is also a sponsor of the Rockfall symposium on

climate change and trees, which will be held at MxCC on Friday, May 12.

In support of the movie theme for the meeting, refreshments, provided by Kim and Kathy Meyering, included two kinds of Twizzlers, freshly made popcorn, Dots, Milk Duds, home-made brownies and a multitude of other delicious reminders of matinees past.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:05 pm, followed by a showing of the Doug Tallamy film, "Hometown Habitat."

# The Cylburn Arboretum Friends Nature Center

Proposed by St. George's Garden Club, Seconded by Garden Club of Twenty,

Cylburn Arboretum is an oasis: 200+ acres of specimen trees in a dense, urban, primarily low-income area of Baltimore. The Nature Education Center Garden of native plants and exhibits on the hidden world of trees will orient more than 40,000 annual visitors to miles of accessible trails, providing a needed location for a kids' day camp and school groups.

## The Butterfly and Bee Pollinator Meadow at Chickasaw Park in Honor of Muhammad Ali

Proposed by Glenview Garden Club, Seconded by James River Garden Club,

Native plantings and adjacent picnic areas will transform an unused turf area in this culturally and nationally significant park. In collaboration with Olmsted Parks Conservancy, this area will become a resource for an historically Black community victimized by environmental injustice to mitigate effects of pollution and climate change, improve educational and recreational opportunities, and invoke the spirit of its most famous user through the butterflies and bees who float and sting, just like The Greatest.

# Sowing and Growing Evanston Grows: Urban Gardens and Community

Proposed by Garden Club of Evanston, Seconded by Cedar Rapids Garden Club, This project, a collaboration between Garden Club of Evanston and its partner Evanston Grows, aims to reduce food insecurity in Evanston. A new, large urban food garden will be developed and improvements made to an existing one to increase productivity. Fresh produce from both gardens will be shared at farm stands in the most underserved neighborhoods. In addition, educational programs are planned to make food gardening and healthy eating more accessible to all.
